## **Exciting Opportunity** (report written by Dan Ross)

**Greetings brothers.** I trust this article finds you well and hope you are enjoying your summer. I am writing to tell you about an amazingly generous opportunity that one of our brothers has put before us!! But before I give the details, I want to give a brief recap of our current situation.

As we have discussed in our newsletters and on our Zoom calls, we are at a critical juncture in the future of our beloved Beta Sigma Psi. Prior to the global pandemic, the fraternity was enjoying a period of prolonged success. There were a number of active chapter members in the house, the alumni chapter had built up a small cash reserve and we were even preparing to embark on a muchneeded renovation project for the failing moat walls. Then Covid hit and all forward progress ground to a halt for us and most other fraternities on campus. As the nation slowly emerged from the pandemic, life for our fraternity and many others did not return to pre-pandemic norms. Total fraternity membership across the campus dropped more than 30% and many houses have simply gone away. Instead of thriving, our focus shifted to surviving. Numbers of members in the house dwindled to unsustainable levels; rent payments to the alumni chapter largely dried up and every bit of cash we had available went to keeping the lights on and the doors open. Around the same time, property taxes in the Champaign/Urbana area skyrocketed. The situation became so dire that we were forced to secure a loan from National to cover our taxes. The moat project was put on hold, and in full transparency, we have been using many of the dollars collected for that project simply to keep the house open. Candidly, when I stepped in as president less than a year ago, I feared I would be the last alumni president of Alpha Chapter.

But God had another plan for us...due to the incredible efforts of the current active chapter, the generosity and hard work of many alumni and the strong partnership we have with our National chapter, the tide is turning. We had a record number of incoming freshmen commit through our scholarship process with a number of other prospects heading into fall recruitment. The group of gentlemen we have in the house now have been excelling Spiritually, Scholastically and Socially and were recognized for several awards by National in the spring. Many alumni stepped up both financially and with time and talents to help do some needed cosmetic repairs to the house and the

funds raised through the National Education Foundation have become the basis for a much more robust scholarship program that laid the groundwork for many of our incoming freshmen. We are mounting what has the potential to be a successful effort to get our property taxes reduced thanks to the efforts of a few knowledgeable brothers. As many of you know, our fraternity will be celebrating its 100th anniversary in 2025, and I now stand excited for what the next 100 years can bring for Alpha Chapter. All of that being said, we do not have an easy road in front of us. Our financial challenges are far from over with us facing a shortfall to cover our current tax payments. While our National fraternity has been a great partner, we must consider ways to start repaying our loan to them, and our house continues to need repairs and refreshing.

These needs have resonated in a profound way with one of our brothers, and he is offering up a very generous matching offer to help rebuild our solid foundation for the next 100 years. Below, and attached, you will find the text from a letter from that brother which outlines his challenge to all of us. I cannot begin to say thank you enough for his generosity and vision to get us headed on the right path. I will be joining the Three Zeroes Team as a part of this challenge, and I encourage you to prayerfully consider this as well.

**Three Zeroes – A Bold Message** penned by A Brother From the Early 80s

Hello Brothers of Alpha Chapter,

The alumni newsletters of late reveal a story of gritty perseverance to keep the Alpha chapter at 706 W. Ohio open and running for current and future actives. House membership fell to pretty low numbers after the pandemic, as experienced by many fraternities. Thanks to valiant efforts by our actives and alumni, that trend is reversing and we are looking to have at least 5 or 6 new freshmen in the Fall pledge class. Those might not sound like big numbers, but they represent a critical mass that can keep the house going, and a momentum that our very dedicated actives plan to carry forward.

I know that many of you have heard of this already, and may have responded with your support in various forms. Fantastic! During the latest Zoom meeting, I listened to the alumni chapter financial status which reported we have a current cash balance of about \$35K. We recently received our property tax bill, which of course has been rising year by year along with increasing property valuations. Our tax due for this year... is \$35K. There goes that cash balance.

No wonder the alumni board has been warning us of the possibility of financial insolvency. They weren't kidding. Two thoughts immediately occurred to me:

1) Beta Sigma Psi is too important to let down our actives, both current and future, as they navigate their own futures based on what they learn in college. They learn in the classroom, yes, but just as important, they learn what it means to embrace Christian character and develop leadership skills as they grow in their personal lives.

Thinking back, did you and I know while we were in college what bits of knowledge and challenging experiences were going to be important for our own life paths? Maybe, but I think much of this isn't realized until later in life. And I can't imagine the onslaught of distractions and diversions that today's young men face upon arriving at college. Beta Sigma Psi is the unique foundation to provide for their welfare and help set the patterns for their futures.

2) Next year will be the 100th anniversary of Beta Sigma Psi, which all started with Alpha Chapter in 1925. I cannot accept the idea that 2025 might also be the year that Alpha chapter may be forced to sell the house.

After I considered and prayed about this situation, I came to an idea how to offer my support. I wanted to write this message of encouragement to all our alums, but in particular to my own contemporaries. Those of us who lived many years ago at Beta Sigs have now had three or four decades to grow and achieve many of our goals. We've had time to reflect on how our years at Beta Sigma Psi prepared us for future roles in leadership, team work, and servanthood.

And now the time comes to shore up the Alpha chapter so that current and future actives have the same opportunities to be challenged, to learn, and to build their own futures. The chapter house is an important asset that cannot be taken for granted. We need a thriving, sustaining college home that presents a positive impression to visiting candidates and their parents. One that lives up to the message presented to them about the benefits of the Lutheran fraternity experience during college. It needs to be a place where the actives are proud to live and encouraged to grow.

The main source of revenue for the alumni chapter is rent monies from the actives. Until that revenue stabilizes and can cover our annual expenses, **it's up to all of us** to provide the financial support necessary to stay afloat and press forward. Interesting how this all fits with the motto we learned long ago, *Per Aspera Ad Astra*.

There's no question that all donations, large and small, are helpful. But in all honesty, a hundred dollars here and there just isn't enough to answer this challenge. There's a big gap between where we are and where we need to be. I hope I have convinced you of this, because I am about to make a big ask on behalf of your fraternity.

The truth is — we need alumni to write donation checks that end in three zeroes. Yes, those would be thousands. Not everyone can do that, I understand. But many of you are in a position to do so, and help make a true difference. I encourage you to think about it this way... could you put a "current market value" on the life principles and experiences you gained during your time at Beta Sigma Psi? What might they be worth to you at this point in your life?

To stand behind my own words, I submit this donation challenge to all our alumni. I am offering to match dollar for dollar on **all individual donations of \$500 or more**, up to a cap of \$10,000. Your donation will effectively be doubled, if you are willing to step up to my challenge to "move the needle" and put enough zeroes on that check. If you are not sure – please pray about it, then start at the top and read this message again. Not for me, but for Beta Sigma Psi.

Any successful fundraising effort starts with a target that brings perspective to the goal. Just to cover the upcoming property taxes, and take care of some ongoing physical needs at the house, we should set a target of \$50,000. This is a very achievable goal for the body of alums we have.

I have seen amazing results when people get behind something they believe in. The \$50K target also corresponds with the loan amount we had received from National, which we will need to start repaying next year. Our motto means 'Through Adversity, To the Stars'. Reaching high, toward the stars, is how we meet this goal.

Now you understand the title of my message. Please answer the call from Beta Sigma Psi and be part of the "Three Zeroes" team. You can make a courageous difference for our fraternity as we pilot the future with focus and determination. Thank you.

We want to memorialize those that are stepping up at this critical moment through several naming opportunities. New donations during this matching challenge and any existing donations to the moat campaign received after May of 2019 up to \$499 will be recognized on a plaque to hang in the chapter room. New donations to the matching challenge and any existing donations to the moat campaign from \$500-\$999 will be recognized with a paver brick in the front of the building; donations from \$1,000-\$1,499 will be recognized with a large paver brick and donations in excess of \$1,499 will have the opportunity to name one of the student rooms in the house or be recognized for a large paver brick. We will reach out to you for the language you would like on your paver bricks. This challenge will run from now until Homecoming (September 15, 2024).





"If I were in your shoes again, knowing what I know now, by the time I returned to my current age, I would be a millionaire. If only I had learned some key lessons and skills sooner..."

These were the words I overheard an older gentleman say as he struck up a conversation with a high school student in Houston, TX at a Habitat for Humanity "build day" back in 2021. I don't know if the man's statement was legitimate. It's possible he was just full of himself. But he made an important point that got me thinking: "How would my life be different today if I knew 'back then' what I know now?"



With this question in the forefront, the unfortunate reality for each of us is—as the quote goes (paraphrasing)—"Life is learned backwards... but it can only be lived forwards." While we don't have the ability to go back and relive our college years, we DO have an opportunity *in FRONT of us*...



We have five incoming freshman so far who signed bid cards to join Beta Sigma Psi in 2024. Those five, combined with whoever else pledges in the fall and the rest of the active chapter, will determine the trajectory of the fraternity for the next four years. While we, as alumni, no longer have the ability to directly impact the house as active members, we do have the ability to impact the active members, themselves. 

## **David Skibbe -** News-Gazette Article (article written by author Ray Elliott, 05/14/2024)

Mark your calendars for Oct. 18-19, when the University of Illinois Navy ROTC will celebrate 100 years of Memorial Stadium with a birthday ball dinner and the induction of the first Illini NROTC Hall of Fame inductee — Marine Corps 2nd. Lt. DAVID SKIBBE (Class of '69), who was awarded the Navy Cross for his actions in Vietnam in 1970. Here with a tribute to 2nd. Lt. Skibbe is fellow Marine and UI alum-turned-prolific author RAY ELLIOTT.



After David W. Skibbe had finished NROTC training in 1969 and was commissioned a second lieutenant of Marines, he was graduated from the University of Illinois and then completed training at The Basic School in Quantico before being sent off to Vietnam.

His fiancée, Georgine Tortorella, also graduated from the university and started teaching high school English. They expected to be married when 2nd Lt. Skibbe served his time in the Marine Corps and came home to the Midwest to work at a career in forestry, his college major.

Those plans went awry soon after 2nd Lt. Skibbe spent six months in-country with 2nd Battalion, 26th Marine Regiment, a battalion of the Fifth Marine Division that had fought on

Iwo Jima during World War II and was reactivated during Vietnam, when both the 26th and 27th regiments fought there.

2nd Lt. Skibbe became one of 67 University of Illinois graduates who fought in Vietnam and were killed in action. Not only was he killed, but his body was never recovered and brought home.

With 2/26 being rotated out of country, 2nd Lt. Skibbe opted to join the First Reconnaissance Battalion of the First Marine Division because of his relationship with 2/26 Lt. Col. Bill Drumright.

"David and the colonel had a special bond as he had saved the colonel's life when a flatbed rail car on which they were riding and a locomotive were blown off the railroad tracks above Da Nang," said a fellow lieutenant and author, Dan Kellum, who spent years researching what happened to his friend for a book he was writing. "David pulled the colonel out from under the locomotive before it could crush him."

The colonel reportedly wanted 2nd Lt. Skibbe to rotate because "he had seen enough of the war with 2/26." But a push was made to send all of First Recon's seven-man teams to the bush to flush out a big operation of the enemy. 2nd Lt. Skibbe managed to join the last team sent out to the Que Son Mountains south of Da Nang deep in an enemy-controlled area on March 2, 1970.

In a furious firefight in Quang Nam Province about 10 miles northwest of the city of An Hoa, 2nd Lt. Skibbe took a round in the leg and ankle. Two helicopters had arrived and were able to hover above the treetops, 75 to 100 feet above the ground, to extract the wounded and the outmanned team.

But 2nd Lt. Skibbe wouldn't take the medevac initially because another man was wounded more severely, and the lieutenant insisted that that Marine be evacuated first.

The corpsman described 2nd Lt. Skibbe's wound as a "penetrating wound of the lower right leg, breaking the fibula 2 inches above the ankle, leaving an open fracture. Hemorrhage was moderate and eased after a pressure battle dressing was applied."

The broken leg was immobilized by the application of "a splint constructed from a small tree limb."



2nd Lt. Skibbe continued directing his men and was posthumously awarded the Navy Cross for his leadership. A hoist cable with a jungle penetrator was lowered to extract the more seriously wounded Marine. Then it was lowered again to retrieve 2nd Lt. Skibbe.

The Marines on the ground lost sight of him when he was 30 to 40 feet in the air and cleared the trees. But when he got about 20 feet from the door of the helicopter, 80 to 100 feet above the ground, the cable snapped and 2nd Lt. Skibbe fell to the ground.

Confusion followed. The pilot radioed to the Marines on the ground to see if 2nd Lt. Skibbe was OK. Apparently thinking he was in the chopper, the radioman replied, "Yes, he's OK."

The pilot interpreted that to mean that they had located him and he was OK. Ladders were lowered for the rest of the team, and the choppers left for An Hoa.



It was there that both the helicopter crew and the team realized that 2nd Lt. Skibbe was not in the aircraft. Both helicopters went back to the area and an attempt was made to insert Capt. Lavoy D. McVey to search for 2nd Lt. Skibbe. Another cable snapped and McVey also fell to the ground, presumably to his death.

Because of the enemy position and numbers and dense jungle, it was decided not to attempt another insertion and risk more loss of life. And it was believed that both men sustained fatal injuries in the falls. No sign of either man was ever found in later searches.

Back home, about all Georgine and 2nd. Lt. Skibbe's parents knew that he was missing in action in South Vietnam. Drumright reported this to 2nd Lt. Skibbe's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Skibbe, in a letter dated March 27, 1970.

A subsequent letter to the Skibbes from the colonel described the later attempt to find both Marines, the lack of success and that two men had observed 2nd Lt. Skibbe's body hitting the ground.

A letter to Georgine from the assistant secretary of the Navy added little to what the colonel had written, repeating that the "fall and impact was observed by an experienced parachute jumper and a doctor. Both of these men stated that David did not move at all after impact with the ground, and from experience, both of them believe that an unobstructed fall from that height would render survival too improbable to be logically considered."

"The story as to his demise never sounded right to me," Georgine said, "even after several years of my trying to get answers from the White House. Years later, I received a letter from Dan Kellum,

who had devoted himself to researching and commemorating the lives of Marines whose stories needed to be properly told.

"So after almost 40 years, he contacted me and told me how a Vietnamese local had found David Skibbe, and on his person found a picture of David and me. That was so heart-wrenching. This prompted an even further probing by Dan and is included in the book that has that picture and David's story in it.

"The stress of re-acquainting myself with this situation has taken a toll once again as I was in contact with Dan for some time as he wrote this book."
