Year in Review *(report written by Andrew Elders, Dan Ross, Nathaniel Stoll, Greg Treichler)*

As we come to our final newsletter of the year, we want to take a quick moment to travel back in time to a year ago...

On October 21, 2023, the alumni board, fellow alumni, and the active chapter executive board gathered in the chapter room at 706 W Ohio St in Urbana, IL for our annual Homecoming meeting to discuss the state of Alpha Chapter. During the active chapter report, members of the executive board highlighted that morale in the house was on the rise. Member involvement was increasing, and the active chapter was setting its sights on increasing recruitment numbers, improving academic performance, and continuing philanthropic success. In contrast, the alumni chapter reported an opposite trajectory—namely, dwindling financials. Low active membership in the house—resulting in missed rent payments to the alumni chapter—compounded with increased property taxes and operating expenses projected a future where, unless something changed, Alpha Chapter would struggle to continue to exist as it does today.



And so, in November 2023, the alumni board expeditiously called a virtual meeting to discuss a major concern: the possibility of having to sell the house. The turnout at the meeting was going to be somewhat unpredictable. Would only a handful of people show up? A dozen people? It was around the time of the holidays, after all. As it turned out, over 40 brothers joined the call that night. This left an impression: Our alumni—despite leaving campus years ago—still care about Beta Sigma Psi at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign.

While the meeting, itself, was made up of good questions, dialogue, and discussions, arguably some of the most important conversations didn't occur over Zoom that evening... but, rather, played out in the months that followed, as brothers called brothers to bring awareness to the

situation, brainstorm what could be done to turn things around, and build some strength in numbers.

Since that meeting, over the past year, the number of brothers who reached out and offered support has been remarkable. There are too many positive notes and messages and actions to highlight and capture in a small article like this. But we do want to feature one significant achievement which, thankfully, is helping us deal with the primary subject which painted a gloomy picture this time last year: financials.



Following the November 2023 alumni Zoom meeting, alumni recognized some urgency to buy Alpha Chapter some time. Some initial donations were made by alumni. While they were certainly helpful and a step in the right direction, some recognized we needed more and believed we could go bigger. Starting with brother Steve Geske's "Three Zeroes Campaign", a \$10,000 matching program was launched. Then, two other alumni—Alan Schramm and Bob Mulch—stepped up and offered similar incentives: a \$10,000 and \$5,000 match, respectively. Chris Nack also picked up the cost of the upstairs bathroom renovation, and Andrew Elders, Dave Wu, and the actives brought it to life. Other significant donations were made. Overall, the goal was to raise \$50,000 by Homecoming... and that goal was met! With the help of our alumni, from the time the "Three Zeroes Campaign" was announced up until today, a total of \$65,361 has been raised!

At the bottom of this article are a list of brothers who helped make this goal possible (as well as brothers who donated earlier in the year). It could not have been done without them.

This article does not do justice to extend enough gratitude to all those who contributed to the financial campaign this year. Nor does it recognize all who contributed in other ways, such as donating time and energy to volunteer. All in all, put simply, we are very blessed to have alumni who willingly donate time and money to help our fraternity continue its mission of developing young men in college and life thereafter. We, on the board, greatly appreciate each of you and the positive contributions you made to strengthen our fraternity this year.



If you are reading this and would like to join those in the list below, please consider making a donation! We hope to begin the process of formally recognizing donors in the form of plaques, bricks, and names on rooms at the house (as referenced in page 4 of the last newsletter) beginning in the first half of 2025, so it is not too late! To guarantee your name will be added to the list of donors being recognized, **please submit your donation before the end of the second week in January (January 11, 2025)**. We hope to have an update on the donor recognitions at our **next alumni meeting on Tuesday, January 21, 2025** (see "Upcoming Events" article below)...

There is still much work to be done at Alpha Chapter, and we certainly are not out of the woods yet. But this year has been a significant step in the right direction, and we will be looking to build upon this momentum next year—which just so happens to be a special year... our centennial year!

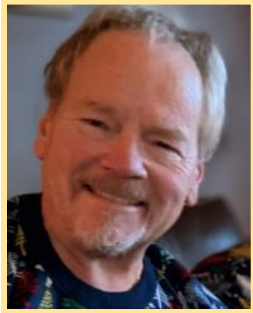

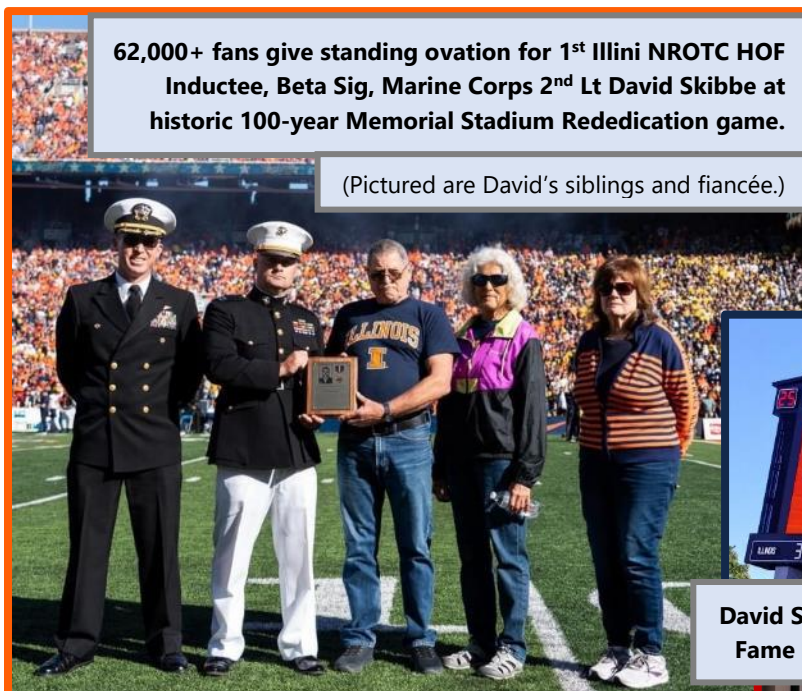

And so, during the first timeout of the October 19th game, the sold-out crowd at Memorial Stadium stood on their feet and gave a standing ovation in honor of the man displayed on the jumbotron: Second Lieutenant David William Skibbe. It was truly a spectacular moment to witness. And as it turned out, just like they did in 1924, the Fighting Illini ended up beating the Wolverines that Saturday. A Look at Alpha Chapter's First Home – 52 E. Armory

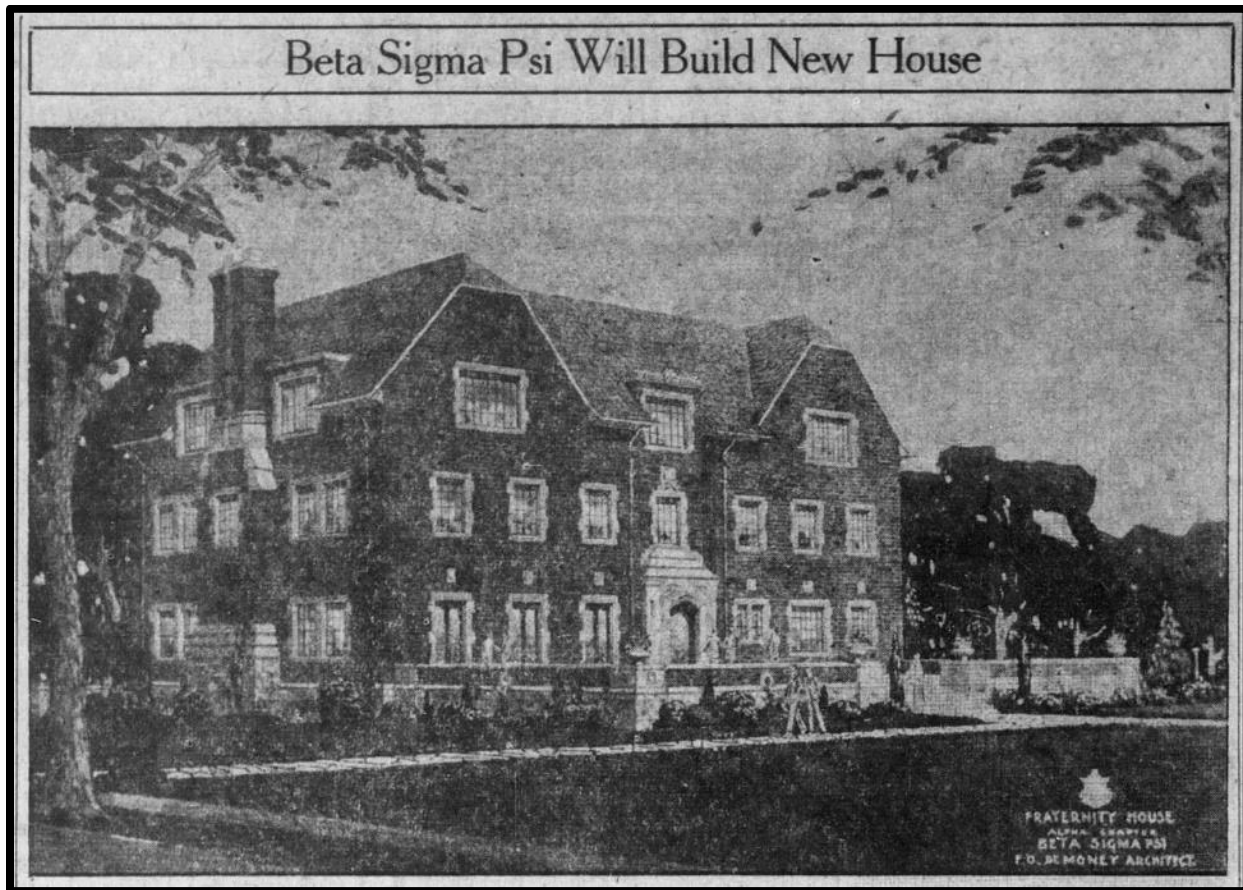

As we prepare to celebrate Beta Sigma Psi's centenary in 2025, I thought a look back at Alpha Chapter's only custom-built house would be interesting. Among the memorabilia displayed at our Homecoming reunion this year were several Illio yearbooks from the 1930s, showing Alpha Chapter residing at 52 E. Armory in Champaign. Either I knew about that long ago and had since forgotten it, or it was new information to me. The photo of the house intrigued me, so being an architectural historian, I did some research. Turns out, the old house at 52 E. Armory was purpose-built for Alpha Chapter. An article in *The Daily Illini* printed on Sunday, May 11, 1930 carried the headline "Beta Sigma Psi Will Build New House" and below that, the architect's rendering of the proposed house was published. Of particular interest to me was that the architect, Frank Osborn DeMoney, was one I was familiar with on account of his architectural work in Chicago and Oak Park.

The article stated that construction was to begin on June 1, 1930, with an expected completion date of September 1. The house would provide living quarters for 41 members, in 19 study rooms in the upper floors and a dorm on the third floor. The dining room, kitchen, service quarters, and chapter room were to be housed in the basement level, and a large living room, guest room, and library would take up the ground floor. The overall design of the house was in the English Tudor style, built in brick and limestone and having a slate roof. The emblem of Beta Sigma Psi was carved in limestone and set into the wall above the central second-story window. The structure of the house was entirely fireproof, being made up of steel and concrete, and the total estimated construction cost was \$85,000. The building site at the northeast corner of Armory and Locust

had been purchased a year prior. There was ample space for the new house, as the lot had a frontage of 146 feet on Armory and 176 feet on Locust.

The September 1, 1930 completion date wasn't met. Another article in *The Daily Illini* from October 18 stated that, "Although the members are living in the house at present it will not be completely finished until about November 1." The article gave further detail about the interior of the house, describing the basement dining room and chapter room as being separated by folding doors to allow for expanded dining room seating capacity. The dining room had recessed niches in the plaster for pictures. The basement also included a fireproof vault for the storage of chapter records. The first two floors of the house were finished with oak beams and textured, colored plaster.

Perhaps the most striking feature of the new house was the exterior, which boasted "an immense lawn" that included a sunken garden with a fountain, and a large terrace porch laid with turf and flagstones. A set of French doors from the dining room opened to the sunken garden, and another set opened from the living room onto the flagstone terrace.

Alpha Chapter spent the 1930s ensconced in 52 E. Armory. The house's French doors proved to be a liability almost immediately after the men moved in for the first school year. In the early morning hours of December 16, 1930, an estimated \$375 worth of watches, clothes, money, a traveling bag, cigarettes, and candy disappeared from the house. The burglar gained entry through one of the French doors in the dining room. In investigating the burglary, Champaign police declared that "they had no reason to suspect the burglary was an 'inside job.'" Otherwise, through the decade, the house served the needs of Alpha Chapter well until the chapter folded in 1940.

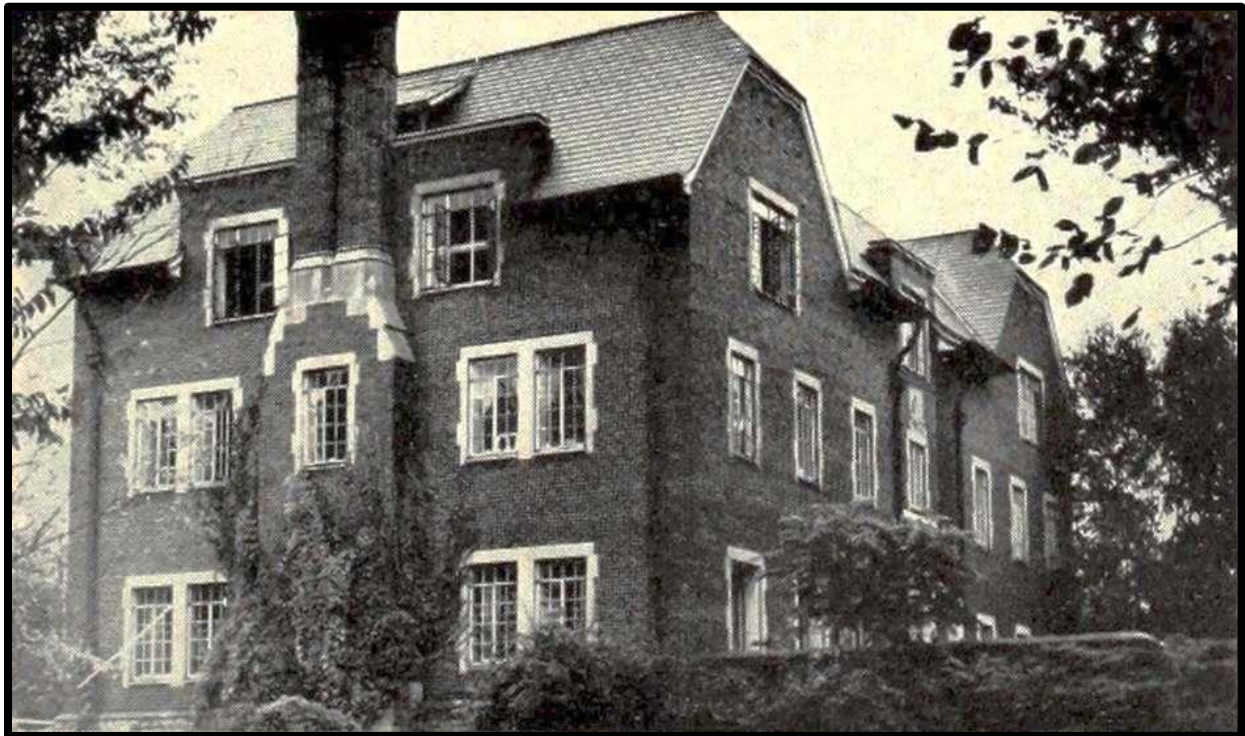


Image taken from the 1951 Illio; note the stone crest above the center window. View from the southwest.

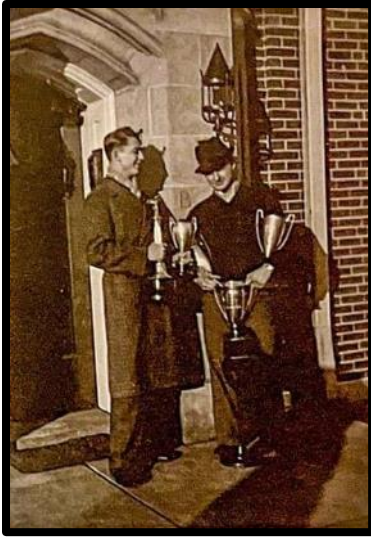
Pi Lambda Phi then acquired the house from Alpha Chapter at auction. The fraternity had formed their Tau Delta chapter at UIUC in 1934 and were looking to acquire a house. The Pi Lams were a Jewish fraternity and it's interesting to note that a Jewish fraternity acquired our original house, and we acquired our current house from another Jewish fraternity, Phi Sigma Delta. The Pi Lams remained in the house until sometime in the early 1970s, when the house was sold to Zeta Psi.

Zeta Psi occupied the house until their chapter folded in the 1978-9 school year, and in the fall of 1979, the house was rented to Beta Sigma Psi's sister sorority, Phi Beta Chi. Phi Beta Chi formed in the spring of 1978, and impressively had enough members to occupy the house after a full school year. The sorority continued to rent the old Beta Sig house from Zeta Psi until the fall of 1986, when the re-formed Zeta Psi chapter moved back in. However, by spring 1988, Zeta Psi was once again reorganizing, and the house was rented to the oldest historically African-American fraternity, Alpha Phi Alpha. They occupied the house the following school year, and by March 1991, the house was empty and listed for sale by an "unnamed fraternity." The old house at 52 E. Armory was demolished after being sold, and the Armory Place Apartments have occupied the site since 1992.

Several alums wondered aloud what happened to our emblem built into the old chapter house; no one seems to know where it went. Anyone with memories or photos of the old place are encouraged to share them with me at aeillini@gmail.com.
