



The number three has a special meaning to Beta Sigma Psi. And this year, all the more... Beta Sig has now crossed into three digits! On **April 17, 2025**, we hit the century mark! **Beta Sigma Psi is now 100 years old!!!**

Given this momentous occasion, on Saturday, February 15th, active and alumni brothers from Alpha Chapter gathered at the Renaissance Hotel in St. Louis with brothers from other chapters across the country to celebrate. During the day, alumni attended breakout sessions with actives to share lessons learned in areas of leadership, delegation, risk management, time management, recruitment, volunteering,



conflict resolution, accountability, and defining and developing culture, among other topics. Later in the afternoon, everyone assembled in the main dining hall to listen to a panel represented by multiple generations of Beta Sigs share their unique perspectives of how the fraternity has changed, yet stayed the same, over many years. The conclusion of the evening was the formal evening banquet. Everyone suited up and joined together for a delicious dinner. Zeta Alum, Mitch Holthus—the Voice of the Kansas City Chiefs—gave the keynote address, delivering a speech chalked full of sports metaphors, enthusiasm, and statements of faith. Chapter House Improvements - Spring 2025 (report written by Andrew Elders)

It's been a busy semester at 706 W. Ohio! We started the year off right in January, when I was joined by **Steve Meyer (Fall '97)** with the stated goal of reviving the dining room floor. It hadn't had a proper scrubbing or sealing in a number of years, and the actives were under the impression that it needed to be replaced. Steve and I begged to differ, so we set about showing the guys how to care for the floor.



And what a difference it made! New life was brought to a floor older than the guys in the house ...27 years old to be exact. Big thanks to Steve for leading the charge!

Among other accomplishments that weekend: fixing a lot of doorknobs, fixing the moat lighting, and teaching the actives some self-reliance. Also, Steve and I were called upon to participate in initiation, and we were able to ensure that it's being done properly.

This winter also saw repairs of the heating system – the boiler was taken apart and reworked in December, and several leaking radiators were fixed and a new radiator installed in the Chapter Room in January. The house is now uniformly warm AND dry.

In March, in advance of Scholarship Day, the pool room ceiling was repainted and a new LED light fixture was installed over the pool table, again in collaboration with Steve Meyer. **Alex Johnson (Fall '05)** kindly donated two new Oriental rugs for the lounge, and they look great!

A terrible storm on March 30 blew one of the Chapter Room's historic, leaded-glass casement windows out of its frame, smashing on the moat floor. When I came to pick it up later that week, one of my employees commented that he'd be able to not only rebuild the wooden window frame, but he'd also be able to repair the leaded glass. And did he ever...I'm blown away by the quality of work. The total time the window was out was only three weeks, and the house is again secure for the summer.




Also, my stepfather tightened and reglazed the pair of attic windows in the stairway. They've been reinstalled for another century of use.



In thinking of ways to jazz up the front of the house, I thought a new porch light might be an interesting addition. I managed to find a historic 1926-vintage Spanish Revival hanging fixture that I thought would be perfect, so I bought, donated, and installed it. I think it makes a great first impression for visitors. I've also sourced and installed hardware for the wood casement windows in the house – it will not only hold the windows closed, but it holds them open as well, stopping them from banging against the brick arches.





And, in the biggest news... **the moat rebuild finally commenced!** While we've had several iterations of the grand scheme floating around over the last several years, I chose a less-invasive, less-expensive, and more preservation-friendly approach. The east wall was demolished entirely and rebuilt, with a 4" concrete block core and faced with brick salvaged from the wall, and a new limestone cap set on top of flashing. The historic pilasters, vents, and arched niche were recreated. The south walls were spot-repaired with reclaimed common brick and tuckpointed with a softer Type N mortar appropriate for historic brick, and new limestone caps were set on the piers flanking the entrance. The Spanish tile cap was recreated as well and laid on flashing; when the roof was removed in 2010, pallets of the tile were saved and stored at an alum's house for our future use on the moat but we were informed that those tiles have been disposed of. Fortunately, I was able to source reclaimed Spanish tile (including blue ones!) from a supplier in Belvedere and we were able to proceed. Unfortunately, this unforeseen hiccup put us a bit over our budget (ahem, if

anyone feels compelled to throw us a few dollars ©). In addition to the moat walls, decayed brickwork was repaired on the porch, the driveway stoop was refaced, and the chimney was rebuilt and repointed. All in all, this project should keep us in good repair for another 50+ years and I think you'll be pleased with the outcome.

And there's work to be done yet this summer. In collaboration with Chi Psi next door, we're having the driveway and parking lot sealed and restriped, taking that off the to-do list for quite some time. We also need some volunteers for other work. If you'd like to participate in a work weekend (or a few), please email me at aeillini@gmail.com. I'm having the guys set up some empty rooms with beds, etc. for us to use if anyone cares to stay overnight and wants to forego booking a hotel room. We'd like to get some plants in the ground, commemorative brick laid in the moat floor, metal railings repainted, exterior trim and doors repainted, plaster repair, trim replacement and repainting in the dining room, and potentially rehab a first floor study room to serve as a model room and guest room. The goal is to have much, if not all of this completed in time for our Centennial Homecoming in late September. Time and talents are welcome, tools are welcome, and money is welcome. Let's keep the house improvement momentum going!

Despite living two and a half hours away in Oak Park, IL, Andrew has sacrificed numerous weekends to drive down to Urbana to work on the chapter house. From performing simple maintenance and doing general cleaning, to working with actives and alumni to paint walls and trim in deep need of revitalization, replace broken light fixtures, patch drywall, replace broken and stained ceiling tiles, replace floor tiles, strip and wax the basement floor (which has not been done in many years), install bathroom stall doors in our house's main bathroom (which, somewhat embarrassingly, we have never had), solicit and coordinate a large donation of chairs, furniture, printing/scanning office and equipment to the house, hire an appraiser and attorney to perform a house reassessment resulting in a property tax reduction of over \$15,000 per year (which is

significant), and develop a plan to take on a project our alumni have been asking about for years—repairing and reconstructing our house's moat wall—Andrew has brought an exuberant amount of zeal to the Alpha Alumni Building & Facilities Director position.

But Andrew's impact has gone far beyond the house: He has deeply impacted the members—both at the active and alumni level. He has brought energy to our alumni board calls. He has reignited brothers from his time to get involved and get looped back into the fraternity. He has made an effort to attend as many Beta Sig events as possible, including our summer golf outing, Homecoming, and the Centennial Celebration, and he has even created informal events on his own in the Chicago area to create opportunities for Beta Sigs to connect. But perhaps most importantly, he has taken a genuine and heartfelt interest in getting to know the active members. He knows every single active member of Alpha Chapter—and everyone knows him. He spends time with them. He listens to them. He advises them. He has deep conversations with them. And if the narratives above did not make it clear, they sincerely appreciate him. And so do we on the board.

"For as long as I can remember, Greg has been the Alumni Chapter Treasurer-Secretary [at Alpha Chapter]. I don't know the exact timing, but I would guess it has been 20-30 years. Serving as our Alumni Chapter Treasurer-Secretary, Greg has managed, documented, and maintained our chapter's financial records and meeting notes for over 25 years. This is an essential role to the operation of the fraternity.

A couple years ago, in preparation for our chapter's annual fall business meeting, Greg tallied up our account balances, looked through historical spending, identified upcoming expenses, and projected cash flows into the future. He gave a thorough and detailed presentation of the financial status of Alpha Chapter and, ultimately, sounded a much-needed alarm that, unless something changed, Alpha Chapter would go under in the next couple years. Thanks to Greg's foresight and

advance warning, with his leadership, he helped us submit a timely request for a loan from the Housing Foundation. We, as a board, set up meetings with alumni and kicked off a capital campaign to solicit donations to buy time. This proved to be a productive effort, and Greg was the point man for tracking and receiving donations, as well as writing and sending personal thank you notes to our alumni on the back end—all the while, continuously monitoring expenses and keeping tabs on account levels to ensure numbers stayed in the black.

Greg has also been influential in building strong, trusting relationships with the Active Chapter from a financial standpoint. Though the road was not easy at first, Greg was influential in building out the actives' budgeting process during the post-pandemic period to ensure that the chapter members were able to effectively allocate funds, pay bills, and monitor spending habits each semester. He helped lay the




groundwork for what will hopefully be stronger financial guardrails in the future.

Amidst an Active Chapter that refreshes every four years and a University of Illinois that perpetually changes and evolves, one constant Alpha Chapter has seen for over two decades is Greg Treichler. There has been a lot of financial activity at Alpha Chapter over the years. Sprinkler installations, window replacements, roof restorations, water pipe burst repairs, boiler repairs, chapter room renovations, bathroom renovations, homecomings, scholarships, moat repairs, countless tax filings, house reassessments... the list goes on and on. In all instances, Greg has been there. His steady presence on the alumni board cannot be overstated. Through many leadership changes, he has been a mentor and friend to everyone on the board which has allowed new members to transition smoothly into their new roles. He also is a vocal member on board calls, and his opinion carries weight due to his knowledge and experience. We are very fortunate to have Greg volunteer on our board.

Court Ruling: Alpha Chapter Property Tax (report written by Dan Ross, Nathaniel Stoll)

Annual property tax, in recent history, has placed a major burden on Alpha Chapter's finances. The graph on the right puts into perspective just how much things have changed over the last five years. Following the 2018 tax year, the property taxes assessed to 706 W Ohio St increased at an unprecedented rate, jumping from \$20,113 in 2019 to \$34,660 in 2024. Cumulatively, (not factoring in the time value of money), using the exponential regression model as a baseline, that cost us around \$38,573 of



additional taxes over the five-year period from 2020-2024 compared to the trend from 2004-2019.

That amount could have covered over half of the moat repair costs. For a chapter working hard to rebound from the impacts of COVID, that's not a trivial chunk of change to have to shell over.


In November of 2023, the alumni board hosted a call via Zoom with the greater Alpha Alumni network, and one of the items on the docket that evening was to discuss this very topic: property taxes. We knew our property tax had seen a significant uptick in recent years. And each year, the number kept growing. But what we didn't know... was there anything we could do about it?

Our former Alumni President, **Nick Schwingbeck**, had already done some legwork on this. He reached out to other houses on campus, and he found out that our story was not unique. Other houses on campus had also been impacted by spikes in property tax. Some decided to take legal action and fight the taxes in court. In some cases, they won... but the outcome, they reported, wasn't as significant as they would have liked. This wasn't what we wanted to hear...

And thus, there was quite a bit of deliberation about this issue. What do we do? Do we spend money to reappraise the house and then spend more money on an attorney in hopes that we win a court case? What happens if the appraisal doesn't come back favorably? What happens if we go to court and lose? Money was very tight at that time, and we knew that if we spent money on something which produced no noticeable return, it would be a difficult pill to swallow.

There was a lot of uncertainty about what to do and what would happen. But one thing we were fairly certain of: If nothing was done, the weight of the increased property tax could eventually cause us to crumble. The trajectory was not sustainable. And thus, we started making plans to go to court to plead our case.

Taking on this endeavor required leadership, drive, and effort, and we had some brothers who stepped up to the plate and made some key contributions. **Bob Goetting** led the effort to find us an appraiser (Charles Crawmer of Crawmer Appraisal, Inc.). (The house appraisal came out to \$540,000.) **Andrew Elders** ran point on finding us an attorney (Steve O'Byrne of O'Byrne, Stanko

& Jefferson, P.C.) and bringing in a member of his company to provide consultation. And **Greg Treichler** handled the paperwork with Champaign County. With those key pieces established, we built a case. And on January 7, 2025, we went to court.

At the end of all of this, the result? A letter in the mail. It said we won our case! The outcome? In 2023, our house's assessed value was \$357,140; the tax we paid on that amount in 2024 was \$34,660.66. Now, though, given the new court ruling, our house is assessed at \$180,000. Our property tax this year will be \$18,565.38. For those doing the math at home, that's a reduction of \$16,095.28 in taxes from last year. This brings us back to normal levels. At a time where financials are so critical, this is a major breakthrough for Alpha Chapter.

A HUGE thank you goes out to brothers Bob Goetting, Andrew Elders, Greg Treichler, Nick Schwingbeck, and Dan Ross who all played major roles in coordinating this effort. One other group to mention, though... our donors. The financial support you all provided last year was essential. The donations you all made gave us just enough of a financial buffer where we felt confident enough to pull the trigger on this. And thankfully, the investment came back with a positive return. Thanks be to God for this source of relief, and thanks again to all those involved who made this possible!

We held our annual College Preparation Seminar at the Chapter house on Saturday, March 8th. This event was a fantastic opportunity to host 12 incoming freshmen who applied for our alumni scholarship. The day included scholarship finalist interviews, tailored campus tours, chapter house tours, and the chance to establish mutual connections for the upcoming fall semester.

After conducting all the finalist interviews, Samuel Biruduganti was selected as the 2025 scholarship



recipient. Samuel, from Naperville, IL, attended Illinois Mathematics and Science Academy in Aurora, IL. His application and interview stood out due to his impressive high school academic performance, elite standardized test scores, and his volunteerism and involvement in church activities and fine arts extracurriculars. 
